## Our Mission

We are a people rooted in worship, branching out into the world.

The oldest member of our church is dear Grace Smith, who will be 100 years old on the last day of this month. When Grace was born in Laurens in 1917, our church



was in its youth, a twenty-five year old congregation still struggling to find a foothold. In a few months, Resurrection will complete its 125<sup>th</sup> year of Christian life and ministry. What changes, losses, and gains

She still hasn't gotten re-acquainted to our bland food! Long life is attributed to many things; good genes, clean living, the mercy of God. Many would point to discipline and sacrifice as well. Resurrection, over the years, has made faithful and sometimes challenging decisions. We remained committed to our ministry in the center of the city, even as it changed around us. We have worked to grow formation ministries, even as competition for time and attention has intensified. We have sought to engage in lively, traditional liturgy even when the cultural winds have seemed in our faces. The Good News of Jesus Christ is lived in and shared here in historic and time-tested ways, though we are also a

people of warm and open spirit, always willing to consider new expressions of faith and the meaningful issues of the day. We have decided, time and again, to invest in our life together as the people of Resurrection, with our precious time and energy and money.

Our 126<sup>th</sup> year promises to be a good one. We plan to retire a good measure of our debt next year, freeing resources for ministry and avoiding budgetary troubles. Our new organ will be installed next year, and you will be moved by the new range of musical expression it will offer in our prayer and praise. The effects of the new instrument on our worship life will be profound.

We also will focus on some basics of the Christian life, continuing renewed attention to Scripture and the practice of discipleship, including a corporate reading of Luke-Acts in Lent-Easter and a study of the Rule of St. Benedict. We live in challenging days for the church and for the Christian movement, in which declining congregations are more rule than exception. Our hope for renewal and spiritual rebirth is always to return to the sources of our life in Christ. These are worship, Scripture, sacrament, and mission. I hope that it is obvious that Resurrection is making faithful investments in all these areas of the church's life and that we expect to be used by God for God's purposes for many years to come.

2117 isn't a year that any reading this article are likely to see. But we believe in a communion of saints and have every reason to believe that Resurrection will see 2117 and even flourish in it. We sow seeds now that will bear fruit in a century, when perhaps a child born in 2017 will review Resurrection's growth and development, its endurance in difficult seasons, and its continued flourishing in the good news of Jesus Christ. We are, and are seeking more to be, a people who dwell in Word, Sacrament, and holy relationship, bearing fruit that will last. By baptism, we are made part of a community that spans the generations from the Resurrection to the coming of Christ's new creation. We fulfill our rightful role in that community when we help build the church, in love, strength, and excellence. What we do here will stand as a witness well beyond our individual years.

Your financial pledge to support our ministry next year will make a difference for a very long time. By it,

you foster the spiritual development of generations of Christians, those already among us and those yet to come. By giving, you also signify your commitment to the way of Jesus Christ, a way of self-giving that invites sacrifice. Thank you for taking the time, in the weeks ahead, to consider the place of the church in your life and in the world and making a gift that will foster our next century and your own spiritual growth. *Nicholas +*

**As we consider funding and planning our ministry in 2018, we asked two of our program staff members to update you on how they use the budget entrusted to them, which is their ministry salaries support.** Elizabeth and Donna have both served our parish for long and fruitful seasons. Your words and actions of support for them are often noted. Noonie Fennell recently shared on Facebook her conviction that “the music ministry at Resurrection has never been as strong and vibrant. It is truly an integral part of my personal worship experience. I am thankful for our musicians and vocalists who inspire us all to worship God and sing for joy.” All who see Elizabeth in action give similar thanks for careful, loving guidance of our children’s ministries.

### Children’s Christian Formation

Our children’s ministries are allocated funds through three accounts, VBS, nursery and curriculum supplies.



I use the funding for nursery to purchase cleaning supplies, snacks and from time to time, a new play item. For example, I saw a nice catalogue price on a clear tunnel for toddlers and purchased it a few months ago to provide a little something new for their exploration and exercise. At this age, formation is relatively simple,

and our parish already has plenty of formation materials. The budget can be kept to a low amount and is only needed for sustaining basic care supplies and the occasional toy or puzzle.

VBS is an important part of Christian formation and has proven an effective tool for outreach and community-building among our children and those from other churches and neighborhoods. I use the VBS account to purchase an attractive program curriculum that should entice youngsters from a wide

age range. I then purchase supplies for promotion, crafts, snack food, take-home treats and volunteer appreciation gifts.

The remaining funds are devoted to general children’s formation supplies. Throughout the year, we hold special events that require supporting materials such as egg-stuffers and crafts for the Easter Egg Hunt, treats for our St. Nicholas visit, and formational books and/or craft materials for Lent. I also spend a fair amount on gifts to show our appreciation to the volunteers who give a great deal of time to Children’s Worship, nursery, Sunday school and special events during the year.

The largest expense that will pass through the curriculum supplies account in 2017 is the curriculum for our new Sunday school programs. In the past, I’ve used a dated, but free, curriculum offered online through Virginia Theological Seminary. Recently I’ve chosen to invest in new programming that should match some of the trends in secular education towards multi-media and active learning methodology. At least for elementary and middle school children, formation tends to happen in the context of relationships with peers. The more participants that we can engage through innovation and creativity in programming, the more likely participants will find shared experiences and insights through corporate bible study.

The generous salary paid to me supports my family. I’m not the primary bread-winner, but I do need to contribute financially. My position at Resurrection allows me to do so, even though my reward comes from many other sources – about 35 of them, actually.

### Our Ministry in Music

Music ministry is an important part of our worship at Church of the Resurrection. The parish’s generosity in funding this ministry attributes much to a quality music program. Musical instruments are vital to our music. A substantial portion of our music budget the last several years has gone for



maintenance, upkeep, and repairs to our 75+ year old pipe organ. The organ’s age and deteriorating condition has not only required our twice-a-year tuning trips, but also many unexpected trips for quite expensive repairs. Once installed and operational, our new digital

Marshall and Ogletree organ will be far more reliable and economical to maintain. A portion of our budget also goes to the maintenance and tunings of the parish's three Yamaha studio pianos.

Extra musicians enrich our music at several special occasions throughout the year. The parish has generously funded to make this possible.


At the center of the music ministry at Resurrection is the ministry of our adult choir. Choir music can be quite expensive with single copies of music often selling at more than \$2.00 a piece and choir books in the \$10 range. For the last several years, we have found a much more economical way to fund the purchase of choir music. Our parish has purchased annual subscriptions to St. James Music Press to provide music for the adult choir as well as the Viva Voce children's music program. These subscriptions have provided us with quality music at substantial savings. The wonderful growth of our Adult Choir has also required the purchase of several additional sets of vestments.

More recently, the Choir Scholar program has been a wonderful asset to, not only our parish, but also a wonderful experience to several awesome young adults. We have been blessed by their presence. *Donna Brooks*

**The Adult Forum**

**Christian Ethics and Moral Theology continues on Sunday.** A skill we can all hope to grow in is the supplication of our faith to the problems and opportunities of daily life. How do Christians decide what is good and holy? Nicholas will get the series started for us and we will also hear from various practitioners whose working lives require attention to ethics. Their subjects will include to medical ethics, the ethics of the end of life, ethics in genetics, and legal ethics.

Our own Tim Wood came to the Greenwood Genetic Center in 2000 and is the director of the biochemical genetics laboratory. The GGC biochemical laboratory

has a broad focus and serves as a clinical testing center for South Carolina, including follow up testing for expanded newborn screening. Tim earned his PHD at the University of Alabama in Birmingham and previous degrees at Samford and Southern Illinois University in Carbondale.

**October 8: Ethics in a Consumer Society.** Nicholas returns as our teacher to share insight gleaned from the Catholic theological ethicist William Cavanaugh and his book *Being Consumed: Economics and Christian Desire*. We feel compelled to participate in the free market and yet must wonder how free we are in the age of globalization and the multinational corporation. How does the Christian take part in an economy that dwarfs our individual lives?

**October 15: Ethics at the End of Life** will be led by Nancy Corley, RN and our own Dr. Ashley Harte. Nancy has been CEO of HospiceCare of the Piedmont since 1989. A leader in hospice and end-of-life care, Nancy was the first person in South Carolina to



become certified as a Hospice & Palliative Care Administrator. She serves on a number of state and national hospice boards and committees and was recognized by the state legislature for her community hospice work.

Dr. Harte (Ashley to most of us!) is Co-Medical Director at Hospice of the Piedmont, a position that



involves both inpatient care at Hospice House and frequent home visits. She was educated at the University of Georgia and the Medical College of Georgia in Augusta and was in residency in the family medicine program here in Greenwood. Nancy and

Ashley will be sharing the film *Being Mortal* with us, featuring physician-author Atul Gawande.

**October 22: Legal Ethics:** Jane Merrill and Andrew Hodges will lead us into the world of the law and ethics in its practice. Some well-known rules govern professional ethics in law; how might considering those sharpen the ethical reflection of those who are sometime clients of lawyers? Perhaps growth in our

own capacity to reason about human life as disciples of Christ would lead us to quicker settlements, less litigation, and a holier human community. Jane Merrill has practiced law for 10 years in various capacities. She's been a judicial law clerk, criminal



prosecutor, and civil defense litigator. Jane opened Hawthorne Merrill Law, LLC in 2013, where she practices in family, criminal, civil, and veterans appellate courts, and serves as a Certified Circuit Court Mediator. Jane is married to Albert, and they have two daughters, Leslie Juul, 11, and Rebecca, 9. Andrew

Hodges is a 1995 graduate of University of Kansas School of Law. His first 16 years of practice were as a prosecutor at the 8th Circuit Solicitor's Office. In 2013 he opened The Hodges Law Firm, LLC, where he is in his fifth year of private practice. He has been married to Dawn Puderbaugh Hodges since 2003. They have a 12 year old son, Drew.


