HOLY WEEK AND EASTER AT RESURRECTION

March brings to us Holy Week and Easter, the annual opportunity our liturgical tradition offers to renew faith in the power of Jesus' death and resurrection. Walk the way of the Cross with him from Palm Sunday to Easter Day, experiencing the sorrow, wonder, and joy of the love of God revealed in Jesus. **Note some differences this year.** The Noon service on Good Friday is the Way of the Cross. The Daughters of the King are offering silence and meditations on Good Friday before and after the Noon service. Also, the Great Vigil of Easter will be held **here** with Immanuel Lutheran and Trinity Abbeville at 8:30 PM on Easter Eve. There are three services on Easter Day, the first at 7:30. Be with us (and invite a friend) for these liturgies in which the hope of the whole creation is on display.

Let the music over the next few weeks help you in this time of personal reflection; let the quieter nature of our services and music allow you to hear God's voice to you.

Filling Our Buckets on Wednesday Evenings

My daughter came home from school one day a few weeks ago talking ceaselessly about how full her bucket was. Our drive home for the next several days included conversation about all the good things she did and received, boasting her full bucket. At first I had no idea what she meant and thought it was her teacher's classroom management technique. But later I realized Delaney was speaking about a lesson she learned from a book, How Full is your Bucket? For Kids. Since having children I have developed a keen appreciation for children's literature. Several times I have realized that some of the books my children read have inspired me greatly, and this one was no exception. The book teaches the simple message that paying forward kindness lifts both the receiver and giver; kindness doesn't just add, it multiplies. So grew the idea for a kids' outreach program in Lent.

On Wednesday evenings a dedicated group of kids have been filling their buckets to the brim. They decorated placemats and cookies that we took to the Soup Kitchen the following morning. The placemat decorations included an inspirational verse, Jeremiah 29:11, along with sweet messages straight from the children's hearts – "You are special." "Someone cares about you." The following Wednesday the kids made jewelry, aprons, and tote bags that they will sell to raise money for supplying care packages for kids in crisis at Meg's House. On future Wednesdays, the kids plan to make thank-you cards for our local police, fire and paramedics and to complete their Lenten outreach project for Meg's House. We are fortunate to have children in our midst so willing and capable of spreading God's message of hope and grace in our community. Christian Community Found; Testimony from a Newer Member of Resurrection

I wanted to say how much I appreciate the kindness that has been extended to me and my children at Resurrection. We are still relatively new members of the Church, but I am starting to understand what it feels like to have a "church home" and a "church family," something I have never experienced until now, and I am grateful.

Sometimes the most unexpected connections emerge that in hindsight seem both miraculous and intentional all at once. Some of those connections are with new friends and some with people I have never met but who remain close in spirit.

The children and I have lived in Greenwood only for a few years. When I chose the house where we live, perhaps what appealed to me most was the beautiful landscape around the house, the small pond, the geese on the water, the turtles, the promise of dogwoods in springtime. It seemed like a balance of "city" and "country" life, and it has been just that. After we moved to Greenwood, the children and I visited a number of churches before arriving at Resurrection one Christmas season, just in time for the Nativity program.

Our neighbors the Russells had invited us to attend this Christmas program. They have always been wonderful neighbors, (and Kim makes the best

cinnamon rolls, too!), but what most impressed me about them was that during a season of tremendous hardship in my life, they reached out to me with empathy and encouragement and seemed to truly care. Later, the Russells also introduced me to other friends at Church -- like Salley Hyatt. The story of how I met Salley is an essay in itself, but the main point is that I like to think that God brought me and Salley together because He knew that one day we would need this friendship.

I have been blessed to meet many wonderful, soulful people at Resurrection, like the people Father Nicholas mentioned several Sundays ago, the kind who remind one of God, and I have often seen the face of God in friends at Resurrection. I remember the Sunday I met Ann Arnold, and it seemed like I had known her for a long time, even though it had only been minutes. Later, there was a special Harvest dinner that Ann and Bill invited me to attend along with other church friends. We had a lovely dinner, and when I experienced first-hand how uplifting that dinner occasion was, I understood the goal of the Harvest Meal venues and the importance of bonding time with kindred spirits. I think Ann's husband Bill could be a wine expert, and he taught us everything that one needs to know about ice wine, a substance that only a few weeks ago I learned existed. It was a special evening, and I felt like I was meeting friends I had known for a long time -- although, in reality, I had only just met them. I think it was Byron who said that "such things are rare in time but frequent in eternity."

It is also rare to get a new grandmother, and Becky McDaniel is the best new grandmother that a family could have. One Sunday, Becky suggested that we try the newly opened Inn on the Square for lunch, and so we did. She reads the paper from beginning to end and is always informed about new restaurant openings, which helps us find the best places. Often Mary Lou Harwell goes out for lunch with us, too, and sometimes Sandy Singletary. When the children and I attend the 10:30 service we try to sit with Becky, and she is an example of how I envision a Christian to be in the "real world." My favorite part is that even when my children are probably too loud during the service, Becky never seems impatient or frustrated or annoyed. She is always kind, patient, and loving, like in that verse in Corinthians. If there is something special happening during the service, Becky will ask if Colt can see well enough or if he would like to exchange places with

her. I value how Becky (and other new friends at Resurrection, too) seems to love us although we have only known her for a short time, and I like to think that in the Christian world, love is something that does not need a long time to take roots. It seems that all the people at Resurrection have a special love for the children of the church, and I try to be that way, too.

Each person I have met at Church has been so kind, compassionate, sincere, helpful, and “real,” people like Becky, Brenda, Mary Lou, Roger, Salley, Norm, Barbara and Carl, Tom, Paige, Denise, the Russells, the Arnolds, the McMillans, the Floyds, Frank, Catherine, St. Clair, Josie, Sandy, Father Nicholas, and many more. While everyone I have met at Resurrection has been incredibly kind to me and the children, I want to especially affirm how much I have appreciated Barbara and Carl Brock (who were some of the first visitors at my house); Norm Fawcett (who helped the children learn to be acolytes, patiently answering a million questions that he must have answered already a million times for other children); Roger (who has the voice of an angel); Tom Cobb (who is so nice like the best uncle ever that I had to say “yes” to being a coffee hour host even though I had no idea what was involved, and then he was kind enough to help me wash the big coffee pot that was too large for the sink); Brenda (who emailed encouraging thoughts and who prayed for me); Becky McDaniel (who is like a new grandmother to us and who takes time to remember birthdays and holidays like only grandmothers can); John Cobb (who helped me find some repair people for a house project); Mary Lou (who understood the art of my sister’s blue-ribbon sweet pickles); Ann and Bill Arnold (who invited me to one of the most special dinners I have ever attended); the McMillans; the Floyds; Frank Wideman; Catherine Brooks (who is an incredible role model for people of all ages); Paige; Josie; Salley (who is brave enough to take a snake out of a swimming pool but also sensitive enough to hear what isn’t said aloud); and Allen (who invited my children to attend youth group). I know I am leaving out many wonderful new friends, and I hope you will forgive me for forgetting some of these most important chapters.

In another chapter, I lived in Raleigh, NC, where my family still resides. It is a large extended family where I have 21 first cousins and a growing line of second cousins. I miss that family daily. When I moved to SC 21 years ago I did not know all the chapters that would unfold, and perhaps if I had known the details of some

of those chapters it would have been hard to be brave. Kierkegaard would say that “life must be lived forwards, but it can only be understood backwards.” I agree, and today I understand the value of family more than I did yesterday, and I appreciate the opportunity to be part of a “church family.”

A few weeks ago, when I called John Cobb to ask if he might recommend a plumber, he took time to talk with me, even coming to my house on short notice to look at the problem. I was so touched by his generosity of time, his kindness, and his spirit of service that it was hard for me to hold back the tears when he said how he loved “helping church family.” I felt so honored that I might be included in the group of “church family” because I have never had that family.

That characteristic, of treating people like family even though we are not biologically related, seems like one of the best parts of my experience at Resurrection so far, and I am grateful to have this connection. I appreciate everyone who makes us feel like family. I know that in the “real world,” we might have been considered strangers, but I am thankful that at Resurrection we were recognized as friends or even as family.

I like to think that God would treat us like family if He were here in person --- that He would treat us like a member of the best sort of family, where people are patient, kind, forgiving, loving, present, honest, and “real.” I look forward to spending time with other members of the church family, too, and I hope that if I could ever be of help to you, that you would let me know.

Although I did not realize it when I moved to Greenwood, the house I purchased had belonged to a former Resurrection member, Thelma Cook, and I understand that she was quite involved at Church over the years. I like to imagine that perhaps Thelma helped lead us to Resurrection, and perhaps because of her great love for the Church, her spirit played a role in helping us find this haven.

Attending Resurrection has felt like coming home, like returning to a place that I did not know I had lost or that had even existed, and somehow I wanted to share with you how wonderful the people at Resurrection are -- although I know you already know. *Renee Love*

Our Camp Kanuga Day Camp offers creative and educational activities that allow campers to engage with their community and make new friends. All activities are conducted on-site and are designed specifically for younger-aged campers (5-11 years old). Day camps are a great way to introduce children to the summer camp experience.
