## **Our Mission**

We are a people rooted in worship, branching out into the world.

### *Things Done and Left Undone*

One of our prayers of confession of sin speaks of “things done and left undone.” We fall short of our calling as creatures made in the image of God both by what we do and what we fail to do. We miss the mark of our calling as followers of Christ both in our activity and in our passivity. January is a time in which we think on such things, noting what we wish we’d done and events we wish had never happened, and making resolutions to avoid or embrace various courses of action for the future. Perhaps January is our secular culture’s Lent, when people decide to live more strenuously, with greater discipline, and toward larger goals. (Then February comes...)

About this time last year, I wrote about “our hopes and dreams for 2016” which included “a summer youth and mission intern to work with our summer ministries...an acoustic trio weekend in April designed to broaden our musical styles for worship...a race and reconciliation series...a gift of \$5000 to Habitat for Humanity for their Mineral Court project...[and] new relationship with some local music majors through a Choir Scholars Program.” I am pleased to see that we were led to accomplish much of that ministry.

I also wrote about other organizational challenges, particularly a need to make sure that our Parish Life ministry builds up our community without exhausting its leaders and a need to study best practices in mission and outreach, with hopes of drawing together our giving to mission agencies, our own neighborhood mission efforts, and the fundraising efforts for mission that we have now embraced. We hoped this reflection would provoke new interest in the work of the Mission Committee. We also appointed an Organ Study Committee to take a hard look at our struggling instrument. Again, I see evidence of your hard work, as well as opportunities for further refinement or completion of what we did.

There were also unexpected gifts and accomplishments. We completed the reconstruction of our old playground on the back lot, now christened the Marion Avenue Community Park, that after engaging in a great day of neighborhood improvement called

Lowe’s Day. God also gave us the chance to call a youth minister again, in Mitchell Felton, and to share his ministry with Immanuel Lutheran Church. And it mustn’t be forgotten that we did so much of the basic work of ministry faithfully as well.

You might remember that 2015 was a year in which we intentionally focused on relationships, hosting the Emmaus Weekend and other opportunities to grow closer as the body of Christ and in spiritual practice after some long months of moving, building, and moving some more. 2017 will be also be a year for our church to focus on relationship, consolidate recent expansions of our ministry, and perhaps be ourselves with greater care and some less ambition to start new things.

In the fall, we spoke about developmental goals that would make some recent accomplishments more enduring. We named desires to review our hopes and expectations for youth formation, better resource our tutoring program, host a festival of hymns, conduct a capital campaign to reduce or eliminate our mortgage, and host one or more workshop opportunities to grow our capacity to work together in the fullness of the gifts God has given us. As the last few pledges come in and our budget is established, we will see how our plans take final form. Some require funding; others more time and attention. God can get this work done through us in a variety of ways.

It is nice to get good things done, and it is the human tragedy that we get so many tragic things done as well, as the nightly news reminds us. We do well also to wonder about all the things we leave undone. They are not all subjects for confession; sometimes perhaps we are preserved from sin by our laziness! The road not taken may have been a better one or it may have been worse. January days could teach us that sometimes we should simply sit with those we love and not paint the kitchen or rake the leaves.

I hope our church will again find that faithful balance, of doing and refraining, of accomplishing and simply being. We know and serve God when we act faithfully in God’s name; we know and serve God as well when we sit in his still silence and wait. What is

true for each of us is true for Christ's beloved church as well. *Nicholas+*

### **A Report from the Organ Study Committee**

Late last year, our parish put a down payment on a new organ for our parish. This investment comes after much reflection by the Organ Study Committee and the Vestry. This decision aligns with our mission of worship at the center of our life together, will open new doors in music ministry, and will open our ears to new possibilities in understanding our Episcopal liturgy. It will further our mission. We are excited and want to explain how this decision was reached.

This past summer the Organ Study Committee (Donna Brooks, Dick Daffin, Brooks Kuykendall, and Lucas McMillan) concluded two things: our current 1930s pipe organ was unstable, unpredictable, and did not warrant the expensive rehabilitation it needs; (2) our parish was unable to pursue a replacement pipe organ because of limitations both architectural and financial. Our church does not have the interior space required for pipes to support congregational singing. A new pipe organ is simply beyond our financial capacity.

The Committee focused on evaluation of electronic and digital instruments as best options. We examined several companies and organs in our area. Two options emerged: an Allen organ (the lone major manufacturer) or a Marshall and Ogletree (M&O) organ ([www.marshallandogletree.com/](http://www.marshallandogletree.com/)). Representatives from both firms provided general and financial information to us. We sought ways to play and hear these organs and also reflected on our collective experience with these organs.

One major consideration was to have an instrument that could much better provide a foundation for congregational singing and choir accompaniment. For those of us who sit at the back of the nave, we know our current organ cannot sustain hymn singing nor support the choir as it processes.

As we considered our options, we recognized that M&O has revolutionized the organ world because its instruments truly duplicate the sound of pipe organs. This is because M&O instruments rely on an audio library of recordings of pipes from celebrated



instruments—not sounds created electronically, as with a synthesizer. Thus, an M&O organ sounds (and feels) like a pipe organ. This is the reason that Trinity Wall Street in New York chose an M&O instrument rather than build a new pipe organ.

After much analysis, we recommended that the Vestry sign a contract with M&O of Boston. Here are the key factors in our decision:

- The M&O proposal called for divisions of sound to be placed in the chancel area and another “antiphonal division” to be placed at the top of the back wall of the church. The antiphonal sound does not replicate sound from the chancel area, but has its own stops—just like a pipe organ and would help in congregation singing.
- This 3 keyboard organ comes with a 1970 Casavant console. (This Quebec firm built organs for Trinity Cathedral, Columbia, and for Twitchell Auditorium, Converse College.) M&O will refurbish and repurpose this “used console” for us. Doing so allows us to save 1/3 off the total price of the instrument.
- The M&O proposal was intentional to our church (the building), our parish (the parishioners), and our music (Episcopal liturgy). We are not having to choose one of the options available, but instead will give feedback to shape our own instrument after professional advice is rendered.
- The organ will have 38 stops of different sounds plus alternate stops for an additional 75 sounds that we will pick. We provide requests on what sounds we believe we would utilize in our worship. Our current organ has limited sounds and Donna has been unable to use many of them because of the organ’s unpredictable nature. Thus, if you

think of the color wheel, we have only been hearing red and orange, whereas the new M&O instrument will give us options of many colors.

- Given M&O’s audio library and the technology involved, this instrument is updatable and dynamic. But annual costs for tuning and repairs (which have been of greater frequency and expense in recent years) will essentially disappear, due to the digital nature of the instrument.

Benefiting our decision is that Erskine College has an M&O organ. (Watch and listen to this organ at <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=8ZITECVDsLA>) Erskine’s experience with M&O since 2008 illustrates great satisfaction with the firm’s customer service and quality work. With Erskine’s M&O organ nearby, parishioners can hear a similar instrument to the one that will come to Resurrection. So, opportunities to see and hear this instrument will be announced in January.

The total cost of this new organ is \$225,000. We will raise funds for its purchase at the same time that we seek to retire our mortgage. The vestry believe that we have the capacity to do so; our Annual Meeting next month will include more detailed financial information. Your support will make a great difference in setting our worship on a solid foundation for the next generation.

We are excited about this new day for Resurrection and our music ministry. Our worship will be vastly enriched by this new organ and other doors to mission will be opened by it. Feel free to talk with any of us if you have any questions.

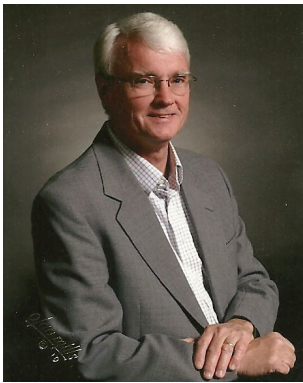

Supper will be served after the meeting and childcare for young ones will be available. 2017 will be a big year in the life of Resurrection, with plans developing for a new organ and to retire or reduce our mortgage. We'll have a first look at those efforts, elect Vestry members and convention delegates, approve a budget, and review the ministry we shared in 2016. Vestry nominees are:



Joe Fennell: I am 65 years old and have been married to my wife, Noonie, for 43 years. I was born into Church of the Resurrection in 1951 and have stayed here with the exception of a 10 year move to Texas while I was in the army.
