FROM THE RECTOR

Resurrection, for this Life and the Next

The Easter feast approaches, and with it comes television shows and magazine articles about Jesus, his trial and death, and his Resurrection. Doubts will be shared and questions asked. Did it really happen? We in the church will celebrate more than question, with glorious hymns, brass music, proclamation, and bright flowers. I would like to suggest that the best questions to ask about the Resurrection are not about its veracity, though I take it to be one of the most fundamental truths of the universe. The question I would ask Christian people is whether the Resurrection matters, to them, in this world and the next.

The Resurrection is a reality to be spoken of on at least three levels. It is what we believed happened to Jesus, on the first day of the week, after the forces of the Empire hung him to death on a cross. Resurrection in the first sense is Christ's rebellion against the forces of violence and domination, against sin and death. It is also something we hope for ourselves in the future, a raising to new life that somehow includes these bodies in which we have been known and loved for as long as we have known ourselves. In between Christ's resurrection in the first century and ours (whenever and however it comes) is the Resurrection life we are meant to have right now.

So here is the question I think matters most these days, regarding that final sense of resurrection, the right now aspects of the resurrection power of God: What difference does the Resurrection make, for today and tomorrow, for the average Monday and the tedious Tuesday? Does it matter now, for the present living of our lives, that Christ has been raised?

I surely think it does, for the Resurrection has the power to reframe our lives and give us a different sense of every thing. If the Resurrection means that death is not the end, then our lives must be measured differently. We are not merely in mad pursuit of optimal life (pleasure, security, power) between here and our last breath. Different paths, greater risks, more

faithful sacrifices can be made if we are going to live beyond the grave. An abiding sense of Resurrection will lead us to treasure the body and the physical elements of life more than otherwise, perhaps resisting the virtualization of relationship, commerce, and culture. Perhaps most significantly, a consciousness filled with Resurrection will be one pervaded with joy, one that can relegate fear, one that senses the unstoppable power of divine life and the good will of God behind the changes and challenges of the world. The Resurrection gives us a certain confidence that otherwise would be naïve.

So it ought to be possible to see people "practicing resurrection," as poet-essayist-critic Wendell Berry has encouraged in his poem "Manifesto: The Mad Farmer Liberation Front." (You can google it...or go by MaCaslan's and ask them to order his New Collected Poems, from 2012) Some of the evidence of the Resurrection, unlikely to be mentioned in magazine and television offerings of the season, is the palpable, Spirit-driven difference in the lives of Christian disciples, in the first century and the twenty-first. I can certainly think through some of the holy things that happen in our church, through your sacrificial love, that would lead me to believe that the Resurrection is real and has changed us.

Clarence Jordan was one of the great Christians of the American South in the last century, a Georgia Baptist committed to racial justice. He told his Americus neighbors, during the struggle against segregation, that were being asked to choose whether they would follow their grandfathers or Jesus Christ. In one of his Easter proclamations he insisted that the "(t)he proof that God raised Jesus from the dead is not the empty tomb, but the *full hearts of his transformed disciples*. The crowning evidence that he lives is not a vacant grave, but a *spirit-filled fellowship*. Not a rolled-away stone, but a *carried-away church.*" (continued)

I like Clarence's ideas, and yet I'll take it all as evidence; the stone rolled away, the tomb empty, the grave vacant, and the lively church, itself the living Body of Christ, living in an abundant love that would be foolish if Christ is not alive. Do your part in the days and years of your life ahead. Practice resurrection and add to the evidence that Christ lives. You might change some minds; you'll certainly have some fun, and your life will manifest the greater significance it was given, long ago, on the first day of the week. *Nicholas*

A Letter of Thanks to Resurrection

We have received Resurrection's check for \$1800, representing yet another gift in your long, long history of generously supporting our Greenwood Soup Kitchen. We are grateful that you remember us in such a significant way each year, and we are thankful for your continuing thoughts and prayers.

We wrote to you last year indicating that after seven or eight years of steady increases, we were finally starting to see progress in the number of people visiting our Soup Kitchen. During 2017, we served 28,327 hot meals, a 10% improvement as compared to 2016. These trends are very encouraging and we are thankful that the stronger economy is resulting in more of our neighbors being able to feed and care for themselves.

In September of 2017 the Greenwood Soup Kitchen celebrated 30 years of continuous service to our Greenwood Community. We continue to be 100% volunteer organization, with over 120 kind souls giving of their time and talents to ensure everyone in Greenwood is offered a daily, hot meal. Over the past 30 years we have often said among ourselves, "Remember, our objective is to serve no One", meaning, at that point, there would be no Need! Unfortunately, we have not yet been able to meet this objective. While the number of guests we are serving may be improving from the record high levels experienced over the past years of economic turmoil, the need is still great. We hope that the next year will continue to bring more relief to those who have been hurting so badly but, in the meantime, it is good to know that we have friends like you who continue to help in such a significant way.

GGUM Update

Wow! 2018 has started off with a bang for Greater Greenwood United Ministry. Due to the financial generosity of your church and our other local churches partners, personal donations, two successful fundraisers, and the intervention and accountability programs in place to help clients move from a state of chronic crisis, the Crisis Ministry has been able to increase our level of financial assistance toward rent evictions and utility disconnections. This is making a considerable impact on the lives of these clients and their families. We continue to off "a Hand up, and not a hand out" to those in crisis. In 2017, the Crisis Ministry assisted 1,124 individuals with various services and paid well over \$40,000 toward rent evictions and utility disconnections.

Our Free Medical Clinic continues to serve as a primary care medical home for those who cannot afford health insurance and do not qualify for Medicaid. We serve as a safety net for so many individuals in our community who otherwise would not be able to receive primary medical care. Self Regional Healthcare continues to be a major partner of our medical clinic. In 2017, the value of services offered through the Free Medical Clinic and Dental Care Ministry was over \$679,700! These services are a true blessing to so many.

Enclosed in this letter is your Annual Giving Statement from FY2017. We continue to be blessed by this critical partnership. Many of our churches have increased their level of giving and, as I stated above, we are now able to make a bigger impact on the lives of the clients that we serve through our Crisis Ministry.
