FROM THE RECTOR

Sometime in the early fall of 2006, I called the bishop's office in Columbia and to confirm that my name had been given to the search committee at Resurrection, as I thought it had. No, it hadn't, I was told, but it could be. "Please do!" I said. In October, I had a phone



interview with that search committee, led by Allen Hughes. Elizabeth and I were at Sewanee for homecoming festivities; I borrowed a friend's office for the interview, which was hindered by audio difficulties. I remember that Elizabeth was disappointed that day because she wasn't yet pregnant, except that she was. A few weeks later, members of that committee came to hear me preach in Atlanta, at Holy Trinity Church in Decatur. The famous Old Testament scholar Walter Bruggemann was preaching at the main service, but they let me have the early one. Elizabeth and I had brunch with the committee at Murphy's in Virginia Highland and liked them a lot. Next came a visit to Greenwood, which started with dinner at Pascal's with Allen and Cecily Hughes, a tour of town and neighborhoods with Norm and Roxy Fawcett, a gathering with the vestry and search committee at the Hughes' house, and a long interview with the vestry, led by Alan Treeter. Elizabeth and I had a cheeseburger with Allen at Godfrey's Grocery in Hodges on our way back to Atlanta. I think you all called, to call me, that Sunday afternoon. I very much felt moved to accept.

How much as happened in the years since. A lot of baptisms, more funerals, several confirmation classes. Sermons, teaching, meetings, and hospital visits. We built a new Parish House and made the church interior bright, created a park for ourselves and our neighbors, and got a new organ. These tangible improvements have allowed our ministry to develop, to include a community garden, Kanuga Day Camp,

deeper ministries of formation, and worship that is increasingly vibrant and creative. We have also been able to practice new hospitality, hosting counseling, yoga and knitting groups, and events for the Greenwood Chamber and others. We have experienced much growth and change together.

A basic question I always wanted to ask in my time with you was this: What is God calling an Episcopal church on the corner of S. Main and Marion Street in Greenwood to be? I have always thought that the elements of Resurrection's identity could come together in a creative Christian ministry. The gifts an Episcopal church usually has are for a thoughtful common life and some intellectual curiosity, a sense of the social meaning of the Gospel, and a love of the beauty of holiness in worship. Put all that on our particular corner, and you might perceive a need to think and pray about Jesus' hope that we know and love our neighbors as ourselves, considering issues of poverty, race, and the promotion of a richer civic life. In our decade together, we recommitted to life on our corner and to the calling of sacramental, liturgical Christian people in that context. We discerned a vision together and pursued it. You supported the development of our ministry with your time, work, prayers, and presence. Your giving each year and to two capital campaigns has been amazing as well.

Now it is time for you to start new, with a new priest, on a new phase in your common life and ministry. I will grieve for you for a long while and perhaps you will for me and my family. But you are Resurrection; you believe that new life is on the other side of any seeming end. The tomb is empty, the Lord lives and promises new life to the church. Your work during the interim time ahead will be to sense where you are and how God is calling you next. You will look back at our time and think on things done and left undone and will name hopes and dreams for the future. With that before you, you will call a priest who will work with you to seek those particular manifestations of Christ's kingdom that you are gifted to produce and that you sense are most needed for your mission in the

years ahead. We live in challenging times for the Christian church. Your dedication to that process, to Resurrection, and to the Lord is much needed.

We have had a fruitful partnership of priest and people, of lay and clergy leadership. A test of that work will be the degree to which it carries on, during some interim months and when you call a new priest. Nothing would be better for Resurrection than for you to call and support another rector with the love and commitment I have known from you. Moments of transition and succession like this reveal the soundness of previous work and the depth of any transformation. A successful transition to a new priest will let Resurrection go from strength to strength in its ministry. I will be praying for that and doing all I can this month to leave you ready to take up that work. Your prayers, presence, and participation in the months ahead will make a great difference as well. Let God use you in this season to build up the Body of Christ here. Untold blessings can come from this moment, if you embrace the opportunities it presents.

But I want to close this last Rafters article with thanksgiving instead of exhortation. Don't forget the encouragement to an active engagement with your church in the months ahead, but also don't forget how thankful I am for all of you. My heart (and then eyes) are quite full when I think about you, about your journeys, tragedies, and triumphs. It has been a holy privilege to be your priest and companion in this way. You trusted me with so much, with your stories, your faith, your church. I give some of that back to you now but will take much with me, treasuring you and this time forever. May our God, of surpassing goodness and love, bless you always. *Nicholas*

As part of this process we will be questioning, polling, and listening to the many and diverse voices that make up our parish. We will distill our voices into a picture of who we are, and identify our needs as we begin the search. First and foremost, this will be a prayerful process and we ask for your prayers and support.

We have begun to work with Nicholas to assign lay leaders to assure our ministries continue with strength and vigor. Most importantly, we will rely on your participation, especially when we are seeking volunteers.

Finally, my pledge to you as Senior Warden, is to maintain good and clear communication as we enter this time of transition. Please let me, Joe Fennell the Junior Warden, and the Vestry members know your thoughts, wishes and concerns. 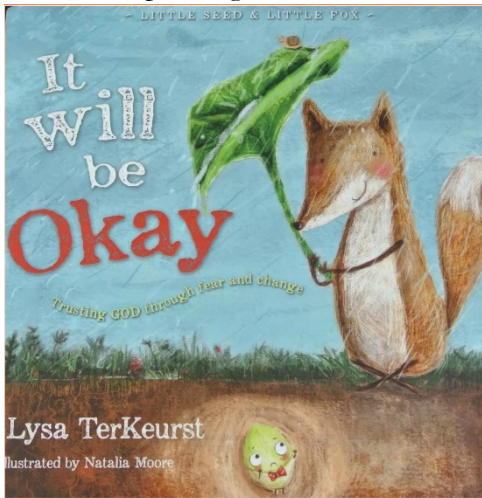
Parish Picnic to Celebrate Summer

The Joy of Stewardship

Our second capital campaign is over and we will not do a third. Whew! But, our stewardship campaign is not to far off. Oh!

If we look at the definition of Stewardship it really boils down to the job of supervising or taking care of something, such as an organization or property. In our case what are we supervising? What are we taking care of? What is our organization? What is our property?

Let's start with what we are taking care of. We are

taking care of our Episcopal Church here in Greenwood South Carolina, of which we are all members. We all have a responsibility as we would with any mutual club to take care of the building, property, and the goings on of the sub groups functioning under our name. We elect representatives to act on our behalf. We have mutually chosen a leader who guides, directs, counsels, intervenes on our behalf, and provides pastoral care.
