



"You shall love your neighbor as yourself: I am the Lord." - Leviticus 19:18b

Dear Church of the Resurrection,

I just finished lectures on Leviticus and Deuteronomy for my Introduction to Hebrew Bible





A few months ago, I was invited to facilitate dialogue with a group of Church of the Resurrection parishioners around issues of discipleship. I have witnessed that you are a community that is deeply committed to demonstrating love and compassion for your members. This group discussed the histories of horror that we did not choose. We discussed that throughout history, the Church has been complicit in fostering denigration and divisiveness among its neighbors. We agreed that in order to love our neighbors well, we must name the evils and brokenness that keep us from doing so. We affirmed that such awareness comes with a responsibility to examine our own practices in regards to how we love our God and show love to our neighbors.

This group of parishioners will continue to discern and listen for what God is calling the Church of the Resurrection to do in regards to your neighbors. Their work is hard, yet it is holy. They are being asked to name the traditions that trap us, the practices that prevent us and the comfort that confines us from radical love and connection. These include racism, classism, and an array of phobias that hinder us from loving because we become too busy putting people into boxes. Breaking open these kinds of boxes will liberate us to love more like God. I encourage you to join in praying for them and being open to the wonderful ways that God might be calling them to lead you.

I invite you into honest reflection and vulnerable dialogue, not for the sake of shaming or judging, but for the purpose of becoming more faithful disciples. Please take time to reflect on these questions and to discuss their answers with one to two other people in the coming weeks.

- 1. Is there a particular group of people, ethnicity or race, that you were raised to dislike or fear?
- 2. Are most of the groups that you belong to completely homogenous in race/ethnicity/culture? If yes, why?
- 3. Are you gracious and hospitable to people who do not look/think/act like you?
- 4. When you think about images that portray good, beauty and sophistication, what comes to mind?
- 5. What race/ethnic background would it be unacceptable for your child to marry?
- 6. When is the last time you have been to the home or shared a meal with someone of a different race/ethnicity?
- 7. How might the privilege of choosing your neighbors make it more challenging for you to love those who do not fit your standards?
- 8. Would you be uncomfortable if a large number of people who are of a different race/ethnicity that

live in close proximity to COR joined? Why or why not?

9. What might it look like to name the evils that hold us back from radical love--not simply the issues and people that we do not understand, but actually name our struggles and preferences that may be antithetical to the kingdom of God? And to extend grace to ourselves and one another as we do so?

What is keeping you from loving your neighbors more faithfully?

You are doing great work in the world, Church of the Resurrection. May these reflections assist in helping you to increase in truth, righteousness and love for you and all the neighbors that God calls you to take notice of—that you might experience deeper abundance and the world greater healing.



Christmas decorations and the memorials/thanksgivings they represent.



Formation Moment: St. Francis of Assisi

The feast day of St. Francis of Assisi is Sunday, October 4. St. Francis is the patron saint of many things, but perhaps best known is his patronage of animals. I look forward to St. Francis' feast day each year because I love animals and I so admire Francis' advocacy for the poor. There a



Francis was born into a life of nobility and privilege, the son of a wealthy cloth merchant and a French noblewoman. He was provided a distinguished education and a position in the military that would have led to knighthood. But after some illnesses and spiritual experiences, Francis began a lifestyle that his peers considered crazy and culminated in his father's decision to disown Francis. In a dramatic scene before the bishop of Assisi, Francis is reported to have said to his father, "Until now I have called you my father on earth. But henceforth I can truly say: Our Father who art in heaven." From that point forward, Francis began a life utterly dedicated to the humble service of his heavenly father.

Francis of Assisi adopted a rule of life devoted to poverty as a reflection of Jesus' human experience. He lived as a beggar. He preached, sang and danced in the streets of Assisi to earn money for the restoration of churches. His odd behavior drew the attention of others, and ultimately Francis founded a religious order, the Friars Minor. Francis later met a young woman named Clare, and together they founded a women's order that also adopted a vow of poverty, the Poor Clares. Francis' dedication to humility and sacrifice had a profound impact on the practice of Christianity in his time.

Francis of Assisi lived a life worthy of remembrance, and it thrills me to see so many churches now celebrating a blessing of the animals in honor of his feast day. Resurrection will host a blessing event on the Sunday following, October 11. Information about this event is in this Rafters and has been shared through emails as well. I hope you'll bring your pet by for a blessing as well as a donation to the Humane Society of Greenwood, our Second Sunday Give for the month of October. But most of all, I hope you'll remember the pivotal moment of Francis' life when he rejected his biological sonship and accepted God as his only father.

We will soon be electing or re-electing a president. It is easy at this time to get lost in the divisive politics and to feel anxious, or downright angry, at the state of our nation and its leaders. I encourage you to remember that God is always on the throne. God is our king, our queen, our Holy Father and our Holy Mother. Ultimately, we swear our allegiance not to a country or to a state or even to a human. Our allegiance, like Francis' allegiance, is to God alone.

If you feel tempted to vent on social media, keep in mind that all places on the political spectrum are represented by members of your church family. If you are sharing criticism or insults of any side of the political debate, you are sharing criticism and insults of your brothers and sisters in Christ, of members of your church family. So take a moment and count to 10; consider how what you write and share may be received by the people you love in this church and in life. We are God's children, and

like Francis of Assisi, we must take very seriously our duty to love <u>all</u> our neighbors – Democrats and Republicans, rich and poor, red, yellow, black and white.

I'll leave you with a prayer attributed to St. Francis:

Lord, make us instruments of your peace. Where there is hatred, let us sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen.


Formation Programs

Our youth have a lot to look forward to this month! High school kids will meet with Mary Balfour on Zoom for some





The Weight of Mercy chronicles Richardson-Moore's experience at Triune with great honesty. It is certainly worth reading even if you cannot participate in the book study.
