Formation Moment: The Journey of Baptism to Confirmation and Beyond

We recently enjoyed a visit from our bishop, the Right Reverend Andrew Waldo, and

celebrated with him the confirmation, reception or reaffirmation of several members of our parish. With that lovely celebration fresh in your memory, I thought you all might appreciate learning (or recalling) a little bit about the Episcopal tradition and theology behind the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation.

A quick look at our Outline of the Faith, BCP 858, will tell you that Holy Baptism is "the sacrament by which God adopts us as his children and makes us members of Christ's body, the Church, and inheritors of the kingdom of God." Baptism is a sacrament, meaning it is an outward and visible sign of inward and spiritual grace symbolized by water and the invocation of the Trinity. Baptism is a sign of the mystery of salvation that was given to all by the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Through the sacrament of baptism, we encounter the threefold journey of Christianity: purgation, illumination and union. We begin with purgation. As the catechism teaches, there are requirements of the candidate being baptized. Moving their focus from the external to the internal, the candidate renounces Satan, then renounces the evil and destructive powers of the world, and then renounces his/her own personal sinful desires. Next, the candidate turns toward Jesus, placing his/her "whole trust" in him, and promises to follow and obey him. The candidate, having turned away from darkness and toward the illumination of Christ is then united with Christ in his death and resurrection through the waters of baptism.

The Episcopal Church performs the sacrament of Holy Baptism most often by affusion, pouring water over the candidate's head. Historically, affusion was used as the mode of baptism only when absolutely necessary, such as in places of water scarcity. The early Christian church baptized by full immersion, and that mode of baptism is affirmed by scripture both before and after the resurrection of Christ. To find affusion commonplace, one must look to Western Christianity in the Victorian era when baptisms were private family events. Churches built during that era had no large baptisteries, but contained small, ornate baptismal fonts, and we inherited that architecture and tradition. Some suggest an even more practical reason for the shift in baptismal mode. Christianity spread to areas where large pools of warm water were not available, and infants were not too keen on being fully immersed. Affusion was gentler and easier to accomplish.

Whatever the mode, the symbolism of baptism runs very deep. In baptism we are united with Jesus in his death. We are symbolically drowned. Baptism by immersion reflects the symbolism better, but the point is the same. To be united with Jesus, we must die with Jesus. Thanks to Jesus, death doesn't have the final word, though. As Jesus rose, so we rise from the water. We are symbolically resurrected.

The symbolism of the water is not complete without the invocation of the Trinity. The pouring takes place three times, the immersing takes place three times, as the priest affirms the presence of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

At this point in the liturgy, the baptized are "sealed" by the Holy Spirit through the application of chrism oil. Our union with Christ is permanent. We are once, and for all time, a member of the body of Christ, the family of God, the communion of saints, living and dead. With the last beautiful touch, we are illumined by the light of the Paschal candle. Often the priest will light a smaller candle from the Paschal candle and

pass it before the eyes of the newly baptized to fix their gaze upon the light of Christ.

Baptism is a public event. It is a welcoming event. We celebrate the entry of the newly baptized into the family of God; thus, the family of God is a necessary part of every baptism. We join with the baptismal candidates in affirming our baptismal covenant. We pledge our support for the candidates. We pray for them. We receive them into the "household of God." In a very real sense, the congregation becomes the village that raises the newly baptized in a life with Christ at its center.

The sacrament of baptism marks the very beginning of our life in Christ. From that point forward we grow into a mature disciple through our formative experiences with our church family and at home. Though the timeline may vary from diocese to diocese, each Christian reaches a point where the sacrament of Confirmation becomes appropriate. Confirmation is the outward and visible sign of a mature commitment to a life in Christ. As we witnessed last Sunday, at confirmation candidates renew their baptismal covenants with the blessing and affirmation of their church community.

Confirmation is not the end of one's spiritual journey, to be sure, but it marks entry into a new level of spiritual growth, one of deeper awareness and acceptance of the responsibility of all Christians. We are disciples. We commit to a life of faith, of learning, of church participation, of repentance, of witness and of humble service.
