Resurrection Foundation

"All things come of thee, and of thine own have we given thee." 1 Chronicles 29:14 (KJV)

The Bible includes many verses about giving. These verses help to remind us that everything that we have is a gift from God and by giving we are sharing our gifts from God with others. I remember



learning in Sunday School that it is more blessed to give than to receive. We are fortunate at Church of the Resurrection that we have many ways for you to give your gifts to others. One of these is through giving to the Church of the Resurrection Foundation. The foundation was established in 2009 as a way for people to leave money to the church during their lifetime or after their death. It is a tax-exempt organization. The bylaws allow for the foundation to give money to the church yearly chiefly for outreach and improvements to the church buildings or property.

The vestry approved in the fall of 2021 to expand the foundation board of trustees from 5 to 7 members. The members include your Rector and Senior Warden, Mary Balfour and David Dougherty, Cecily Hughes as Chair, Bruce Craven as Vice Chair, Reid Conrad as Treasurer and Summer Booker, Secretary. A 7th trustee will be

named this quarter. We work with our portfolio manager, Greenwood Capital, to manage the fund. We follow the guidelines outlined in our bylaws for investment, spending and gift acceptance. We meet quarterly for review of the financials. Our fund has consistently performed well, meeting or exceeding benchmark data. The fund balance as of 12/31/21 was \$844,132.08.

In addition to our annual allocation to the vestry, the foundation is currently giving the vestry an additional gift each year to pay off our mortgage. This should be complete by the end of 2025. These gifts are made possible by contributions from current parishioners and our beloved parishioners who have gone before us. This ensures that the ministries and mission of the church continue for years to come. Many people think you have to wait until the time of your death to give or that you have to give tens of thousands of dollars. The foundation is a way to give money to the church of any amount at any time. We all recall the story of Jesus in the temple watching the widow give two coins. She gave out of poverty while the others gave a portion of their riches. Her gift was given in faith and with sacrifice. Every gift, even small ones, will collectively add up.

The Trustees invite you to consider giving. We will be happy to answer any questions you have. We look forward to a parish gathering later this year hosted by the foundation. We will update you as those plans come to fruition.

Impress upon our hearts your will, guidance, and direction as we seek to please you in all matters pertaining to the foundation of this church.


We are most grateful to those merciful souls, who established this legacy of giving at COR. We

A Focus for your Lenten Mediations: The Dream of God

I recently had the pleasure of reading a book bearing the bold title, The Dream of God. It was written by Verna J. Dozier, and it offers a challenge to the church that I believe we should

consider accepting. I hope you will pick up a copy to read for yourself, as it may be a focus for your meditation during this season of Lent. If nothing else, Dozier's ideas are particularly relevant.

Let me explain why I, personally, so appreciated Ms. Dozier's ideas. I have noticed over the years a disheartening decline in church participation. It is a world-wide, ecumenical phenomena. Even among devoted Christians, regularity of church attendance has dropped as weekend sporting events and travel has increased. I am a part of this phenomena, and I am not pointing fingers at anyone else. But I am concerned. I wonder why. Why are people drifting away from the church? What am I – a church worker – not getting right? That is where Dozier's book comes in. I think she may have the answer.

Dozier separates the institution of the church from its people. She suggests that the institution has gotten in the way of God's dream for his people. Although I think Dozier is too critical of the institution in some respects, she makes a good point. Evidence shows, in fact, that many people deny religiosity because of their dislike of the institution. They claim to be "spiritual but not religious." Perhaps our own church isn't drawing new young adults because so many young adults see the church as just another corrupted institution. So the question then becomes, what can we do about that? Again, Dozier's book has a suggestion.

Most of you likely have heard of the "fall of man." It is the story of Adam and Eve and the theology of original sin. Dozier, however, identifies three "falls." She begins with the fall of Adam and Eve in their choice to eat the forbidden fruit – to abandon the harmony of life in full communion with God. But Dozier continues with identifying a second fall as the Israelites' choice to anoint a king. In doing so, God's people became like the other kingdoms of the world, again deviating from God's dream of a people who trust only in him. Last, Dozier identifies a third fall when Constantine adopted the Christian faith. Constantine's conversion may seem a success for evangelism. Christianity had reached the pinnacle of society; no less than an emperor had become the sheep returned to the fold. But that is not the reality. As Dozier writes, "Constantine himself was not changed; the church was." From that point forward, the practice of Christianity became little more than the profession of faith in a doctrine controlled by the wealthy elite instead of mercy, humility and service to others, especially the poor and downtrodden. Although Adam and Eve's fall is an allegorical story to describe humanity's separation from God, Dozier connects the latter two falls: "The ancient Hebrews, during the time of their establishment as a nation among other nations, distorted the call by turning it into law. The Christians, during the time of their becoming a structure among other structures of the world, distorted the call by turning it into institution."

Perhaps Christianity would not have survived had it not become an institution supported by the

state. Yet its survival came at a cost. The Christian faith risked its alteration to fit the purpose of the institution. The dream of God was commandeered.

Is God's dream faring much better now? The dream of God is for God's people to respond to grace through ministry in community. You might say it is simply to "listen to Him!" as the voice commands from the Mount of Transfiguration. Were the people of God to minister in community, in spite of the institutionalization of the Christian faith, perhaps the decline in public opinion of Christianity would reverse itself. Perhaps church participation would increase. Perhaps evangelism would be accomplished for us as the world is collectively transformed by witnessing our love for one another.

Dozier offers a path of restoration for the institutional church. She names the first step as a role-reversal: the institution must become "the servant of the people of God" rather than the people of God serving the institution's needs. In other words, the institution should support the ministry of each of its members, not just the clergy. Dozier's suggestion assumes a point easily missed: we – God's people – are all ministers. We all have a higher calling. Being a child of God means more than just professing our beliefs on a Sunday morning or writing a check to a local charity. It means serving others as Jesus would serve in each of our daily encounters.

Lent may be a prime opportunity for you to think of what your personal ministry is. How can you play a role in the fulfillment of God's dream? Learn from the past falls. We are not equal with God, and we will get it wrong sometimes. We must rise above the kingdoms of the world by trusting in God alone, not in a king, president or politician. And we cannot do this alone. We must minister and worship in community. Rest assured that Mary Balfour stands ready to assist you in this form of introspection; she wants nothing more than to see each of us find our own personal ministry. Whether you are a doctor, a

teacher, an accountant, a lawyer or a business owner, you have the ability to be a minister in your daily interactions with other people. I'll leave you with another quote from Dozier's book:

"The people of God are called to a possibility other than the kingdoms of the world. They must be ambassadors – again, St. Paul's word – in every part of life. They witness to another way that governments can relate to one another, that money can be earned and spent, that doctors and caregivers and engineers and lawyers and teachers can serve their constituencies, that wordsmiths and musicians and artists and philosophers can give us new visions of the human condition. That is the ministry of the laity."
