From the beginning of my discernment and into my Seminary experience it has always been the



Anti-racism Library Book of the Month:

Where Do We Go From Here: Chaos or Community by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.



"In 1967, Dr. Martin
Luther King, Jr., isolated
himself from the demands
of the civil rights
movement, rented a
house in Jamaica with no
telephone, and labored
over his final manuscript.
In this prophetic work,
which has been
unavailable for more than

ten years, he lays out his thoughts, plans, and dreams for America's future, including the need for better jobs, higher wages, decent housing, and quality education. With a universal message of hope that continues to resonate, King demanded an end to global suffering, asserting that humankind-for the first time-has the resources and technology to eradicate poverty."

Dr. King's book, and many others, are available for all parishioners to borrow and read from our Anti-Racism Library located in the Gathering Space.

Why Should Churches Celebrate Black History Month?

The answer to this title's question is connected to the origin of February's designation as Black History Month. This origin story begins with Dr. Carter Godwin Woodson, an African American historian and university professor. He noticed in his teaching that history books contained little to no information about African Americans, and beginning in 1915, he was inspired to act. Among several accomplishments, Dr. Woodson began leading a celebration of Negro History Day. The day evolved into a week, the second week of February, chosen by Dr. Woodson because it coincides with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. By 1976, the celebration expanded to the entire month of February, and is now recognized world-wide. One of Dr. Woodson's other accomplishments was the formation of the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH). The ASALH continues today as a leader in the celebration of Black History Month, and yet spreads its efforts throughout the year, setting a theme for each year. This year's theme is resistance.

Following ASALH's lead, it is important to remember that celebrating African American history and the contributions of people of color should not be limited to a single month. It should merely culminate in this month.

Whenever the church involves itself in secular holidays, a concern may emerge that such holidays are not our business. We are in the business of celebrating the Gospel. Yet a celebration of Black history is a celebration of the Gospel. God's message of love, grace, dignity and equality applies to all. When Dr. King wrote his famous Letter from a Birmingham Jail, he was directly responding to a petition by fellow clergymen, including an Episcopalian bishop and priest, that he wait. They implored Dr. King to stop the demonstrations he led and allow the courts and local community to resolve the concerns of African Americans at their own pace. Dr. King's letter includes a moving response to these eight men:


"In spite of my shattered dreams of the past, I came to Birmingham with the hope that the white religious leadership in the community would see the justice of our cause and, with deep moral concern, serve as the channel through which our just grievances could get to the power structure. I had hoped that each of you would understand. But again I have been disappointed. I have heard numerous religious leaders of the South call upon their worshippers to comply with a desegregation decision because it is the law, but I have longed to hear white ministers say follow this decree because integration is morally right and the Negro is your brother."

Many white Christian churches missed an opportunity during the 1960s to stand with our brothers and sisters of color and, in the way of Jesus, demonstrate moral leadership. Black History Month gives churches another opportunity. We can learn, and we can use what we've learned to exhibit the moral leadership that Dr. King called us to sixty years ago.

So to answer the title's question, churches should celebrate Black History month because it is morally right to acknowledge the contributions of African-Americans to all parts of our culture, including our religious faith. Therefore, each week during February, we will honor the contributions of an African American theologian, shared by email to the parish. In addition, the Rafters will include a book recommendation from our Anti-Racism library each month of the year. These are but small ways that we might shape Resurrection's future toward the dream of God.








