



Anti-Racism Library Book of the Month:

Appropriate for this back-to-school month of August, we recommend reading <u>New Kid</u> by Jerry Craft:

"New Kid is a timely, honest graphic novel about starting over at a new school where diversity is low and the struggle to fit in is real, from awardwinning author-illustrator Jerry Craft.



"Seventh grader Jordan Banks loves nothing more than drawing cartoons about his life. But instead of sending him to the art school of his dreams, his parents enroll him in a prestigious private school known for its academics, where Jordan is one of the few

kids of color in his entire grade.

"As he makes the daily trip from his Washington Heights apartment to the upscale Riverdale Academy Day School, Jordan soon finds himself torn between two worlds—and not really fitting into either one. Can Jordan learn to navigate his new school culture while keeping his neighborhood friends and staying true to himself?

"This middle grade graphic novel is an excellent choice for tween readers, including for summer reading." It is a winner of the Newbery Medal, Coretta Scott King Author Award, and Kirkus Prize for Young Readers' Literature!

CO₃R Tutoring – What it really involves

By now, most of you are well-aware of our afterschool ministry, CO₃R. You may not know, however, the history of this program and what it really involves.

CO3R¹ began in 2011 with the creativity and hard work of Christine Jayne. She partnered with the Greenwood County Library to meet a need of the Greenwood Community – childhood literacy. As time passed, the program grew and at one point reached over a hundred students. Their "coaches" came from our congregation, Lander University and the Library staff. Tutoring sessions were held on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons in two time slots, one began at 4:00 and the other at 5:00 pm. Resurrection hosted a few of the tutoring

sessions, but the most were held in the Children's Rotunda at the Library.

CO3R thrived for several years and saw many children make great strides in their academic development. Unfortunately, Ms. Jayne's health took a turn and prevented her from continuing with the ministry. A devoted volunteer, Chuck McDonnell, picked up the reins and carried the program forward. That is until... COVID. The pandemic suspended the program mid-year, and it *almost* died. Once the pandemic eased a bit, our parish put CO3R back in motion. Resurrection began hosting tutoring sessions on a more limited basis, and we hope to continue.

CO3R is a smaller ministry now, but it is still an important one. The Library supports the program through promotion and referrals. Sessions take place in Emmaus Hall. We serve 10-12 students on Monday and Wednesday afternoons from 4:30 to 5:30. Each student is paired with the same tutor for every session to support the formation of a more meaningful relationship. Tutors are almost entirely volunteers from our congregation, as Lander students are far less involved. That is where you might come in. We cannot continue to provide this ministry if we don't have tutors.

You may think you are not equipped to be a tutor. But before you draw any conclusions, let me remind you of what it takes to be a tutor. To steal a line from The Beatles, "All you need is love." The students who come to CO3R have good teachers. Volunteer tutors are not expected to teach new skills. The students just need someone to show up. It is largely a ministry of presence. Tutors are mentors; they model the act of learning alongside their students as they complete homework and practice the skills they are taught at school. That may mean guided reading, calling out spelling words, or reciting multiplication tables. At times, the skills the students are practicing (particularly in math) may be new to the tutors. But fear not! The program's coordinator, Elizabeth Floyd, can fill in the gaps in any tutor's understanding of math or

other subjects. The learning process can be a mutual endeavor with no harm to the student whatsoever. We are here to show them that learning can be a struggle, and that's okay! Struggles can be overcome with effort and perseverance.

Please don't allow your fear of ineptitude prevent you from serving in this tutoring ministry. If you have an hour on Monday and/or Wednesday afternoon, consider spending it with the CO₃R program. You never know the difference you might make in the life a child.


Are you a good speller? Come join the Resurrection Rabble-Rousers!
