So if you are indeed drowning, do look up.



## The Lonliest Crowd

Lately, I've been reflecting a good bit on the value of friendships. I've witnessed the formation of my children's friend groups and their dissolutions as friends moved to different schools or, worse yet, moved several states away. This type of loss is just as painful, if not more painful, for the parent as for the child, I'm convinced. And I've experienced my own loss of friendship as Ryan and I moved from Birmingham to Greenwood, leaving behind friends, and feeling the loss of friends moving away from Greenwood. It is true that people float into and out of our lives; it's all part of the journey. The floating out is nonetheless hard and lonliness is difficult to bear.

The church has often been the place where I made friends. As a child, my best friends were in my youth group; that's why my parents never had to twist my arm about attending church. I wanted to be nowhere else. Even as an adult, the closest friends I've ever had, with just one or two exceptions, I met first at church. Church must be a hot spot for social networking.

Although I'm no expert on the history of church and community connections, my observation is that churches that have thrived are churches where friendships among congregants have formed and are flourishing. We attend church foremost to express our faith in God, but let's be real, spending time with our church friends is more than just a perk of church attendance. When people visit our church, or any church for that matter, I'd wager that they are looking just as closely at the friendship potential among the congregation as they are at the quality of the worship experience. I even wonder if the lack of friendships is the reason for the overall decline in church membership observed in the last few decades.

I read an online blog¹ recently in which the author addressed the development of a "lonely crowd"

phenomena within churches. Many who do attend church regularly do not feel a friendshiptype intimacy in the quick conversations shared during coffee hour or over a bible study. How can could we expect any church to survive if it is not a place where authentic friendships are formed and nurtured?

There is no shame in admitting that we attend church largely to meet people of our own age group who share our interests and can relate to our experiences. Friendships are sacred too. In *Leaving Church*, Barbara Brown Taylor expresses this truth: "God is found in right relationships, not right ideas." In other words, we who seek God will experience God's presence when we form and nurture friendships with others who seek God.

The value of friendship is evident throughout the Bible. How did the Jewish community survive their time in the wilderness and their exile and oppresion at the hands of their conquerors? They strove to follow the commands of God as told them by Moses, not just in the Decalogue, but the many iterations of God's laws regarding the proper ways to treat one another. The Jewish norms for right relationships became the foundation of their very identity as God's people. I fully realize that the Jewish legal code included far more than just guidelines for right relationships. Jesus realized that too and set them straight, didn't he? What was new rule - the new mandatum? Love one another. Wash each other's feet. Share our bounty with one another, having no expectation of return. Open our homes to one another. Forgive each other. Respect each other's dignity. Pray together. Eat together. Play together. Spend time with each other. It's called the ministry of presence. Where two or more people gather together, there God will be also.

These points lead me to this admonition and benediction, which I'll share as humbly as I can. Be present. Make use of the time you are at church to talk to people, really talk to them. It's nice to wave, smile and bid each other a hearty, "Good morning! How are you?" But anybody can



do that. Jesus taught, in no uncertain terms, that God expects us to do more than just what anybody can do. "You have heard that it was said ..., But I say to you ...." You can make time on Sunday morning to attend hospitality hour. You can walk to up to someone. Find out more about their lives outside of church. Share with them your experiences outside of church. Invite them to lunch for more conversation. Make plans to share an evening meal or drinks after work. Throw a party, and invite everyone from church. Beyond Sunday mornings, participate in one of the more socially-focused ministries - Men's Group, Primetimers, Resurrection Roots. Even in bible studies and service projects, friendships can form and grow. You need only to show up and engage. For in these occasions, right relationships are formed and flourish. Slowly those relationships grow into small groups, and those small groups become part of the larger community. God shows up, and the body of Christ thrives.


