#### **Faith**

In the time it takes church bells to chime, I have poured a strong, dark coffee and arranged myself at the desk in my office, ready to write. Our chocolate lab



Hazel curls onto her bed beneath. The task at hand is to articulate how and why I keep on. My wife is a priest, and it seems that the parishioners need some sort of explanation for my absence. The medical details given are more confusing than explanatory, and regardless, the real question is, how do I find it in myself to press on?

Perhaps you need more information. I was in a car crash about 15 years ago. I was instantly coma-bound followed by a year of wheelchair. Now, free of such madness, I still endure a severe brain injury -for which there is no cure. The drama, from time to time, is pain. At this point, it stems from a broken pelvis that never healed properly. X-rays, an MRI, and CT scans showed the problems, but honestly, there is no end in sight. I find this terrifying.

A diversion, the thing that no one talks about because it has nothing to do with anything, is tinnitus. No one can properly describe it, much less explain... Basically, there is noise in my ears ---24 hours a day. It does not end. Ever. I shower with tinnitus, I eat with tinnitus, I speak with tinnitus, and I sleep with it too. It is like having a personal entourage of crickets at the ready, on demand, always. You do not get a break. Good times, and of course, the bad. Tinnitus. Yes, it started at the wreck, but in 15 years, my only step forward is acknowledging no one really understands it. In fact, I realized this morning that the real reason I spend so much time blowing leaves off our porch is not cleanliness, as we had assumed, but it is that the sound of the blower covers the buzzing in my ears entirely.

But the wreck was 15 noisy years ago, and the pain comes now? Yep. You just never know. Perhaps the tinnitus is psychological pain, but the physical pain may stop you as well. My hips gave me trouble, but after several doctors and several

more tests, my pelvis is at the root. I have not had the strength to attend church for the last four Sundays in a row. My absence is noticed. I must explain.

With a bit of patience, I sat next to my wife as we successfully made a podcast that might alleviate some of the inevitable repetition. We assured them I would be fine. I hope that is true. What I am in disbelief over is the first doctor missing the pelvis entirely and giving me a second steroid shot to the hip that did nothing, -twice! So -of course, we moved on and now feel like we are with the correct doctor and the correct plan.

The real issue at hand is faith. I don't want to turn all high and mighty on you -or anything like that, but this really might basically come down to whether or not I truly believe. If I am able to find it in myself that God really does care, that I am worth saving, and that He has given those around me the power to take away my pain.

I am just back from a place called Cook Out where I ordered and received some of the best frenchfries in town. All of this went smoothly. But then I got home and was forced to stand and ascend the stairs to our back door. If I sit for any amount of time, my pelvis/hips/hamstrings all lock together like a ring of poisonous snakes. And let me tell you, they bite. This pain defies description but could not be stronger -just from sitting in my car for ten minutes.

Poisonous snakes might help explain how control comes into play. I guess an utter lack of control is more to the point. When your path has been taken from you without permission, control is lost. My car crumpled, steel and glass were stirred up like a milkshake, and there was not anything remotely resembling control left. My car was blue, and the color was the only remaining recognizable detail. Control that. And the sound of a thousand pounds of metal twisting the wrong way.

The issue may be as simple as allowing my faith to push to the front of my brain and satiate the indelible nerve endings with love. A love for my wife -and hell, a love for God. Perhaps I'll have faith in the doctors' minds, my wife's heart, and God's love will shine through the madness.

Maybe then I can enjoy a bit of peace. If I am able to have faith then I can take on some peace, breathe a sigh of relief, and stretch my heart to love everyone in this quaint, quiet little town.

For the record, I am in enough pain and confusion, and am able to contribute so little to this world, that were it not for the loving support of my aunt and brother, and above all –my impossibly excellent wife, then this battered life would not be worth living.

So please, feed your faith, but not your fear.

That may be just the sound I've been looking for.

#### Life After Death

You're probably receiving this newsletter on or very near Halloween or All Hallow's Eve. I love Halloween. I love being spooked by the idea of ghosts haunting the earth and all the possibilities of the unknown. You may not enjoy the holiday particularly, but as my fellow Episcopalian, you quite likely accept the notion of an afterlife. Whether the spirits of those passed still interact with the material world is a different question, but you've probably heard that being visited by a cardinal is a sign that a deceased loved one is still watching over you. Perhaps you've even had an experience in which you'd swear someone you loved and lost seemed very present with you. Such ideas bring us great comfort.

Comfort aside, the existence of an afterlife is a common theme among Christian traditions. I long accepted the idea as a given and assumed throughout my evangelical upbringing that it was a biblically-supported truth. After all, didn't Jesus promise eternal life? Didn't he visit the disciples several times even after his death? I recall a passage in the gospel according to Matthew (27:51-53) where he writes an account of Jesus' death:

At that moment, the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many.

We should be careful not to project our modern notions onto these ancient texts, however. According to Bart Erhman, professor of religious studies at UNC Chapel Hill, the Jewish people of biblical times, Jesus included, did not understand the separation of body from soul as we do. 1 To them, when the physical body died, the soul did too. Their concept of a soul was very different from ours. In the Jewish culture, a person came alive when a spirit entered it. Recall the second story of creation, God "breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being." According to Erhman, the Jewish culture believed that our breath-spirit comes from God and inhabits our bodies, and when our bodies die the spirit doesn't go anywhere. Life just ends.

The notion of eternal life made possible by the resurrection and promised by Jesus as a reward for faith, to the Jewish audience, meant a physical life on earth in a physical kingdom of God. Many of New Testament times expected an end time when a new kingdom of God on earth would be created. This ideology emerged around 200 B.C. and assumed there would be an apocalypse when God would restore his reign on earth and conquer all forces of evil. Jesus was born into that ideological structure, and as the gospels recount, he preached that the end times were near. Eternal life would be the time spent with God after this apocalypse. The dead are raised from the grave to abide physically with God in the New Jerusalem.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> The term "breathed" in this passage is translated from the Hebrew word *ruach*, which can mean spirit, among other things.

Many years after his death, when Jesus' followers began to realize that the end times were not so near – at least by their definition of the word – they rationalized the delay through the existence of an afterlife before the end times. Ehrman asserts this shift in ideology is a consequence of Greek philosophy merging with early Christianity. Greek philosophy, going back to the time of Socrates (470-399 BCE), assumes the existence of an immortal soul separate from the body. To Greek Christians in the early church, the soul continues beyond death. If the person lived as a child of God, at death he/she would be rewarded by abiding in God's presence while we all – living and dead – await the end times.

As Christians of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, we continue their tradition. We profess a belief in "the communion of saints … the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting." I, for one, place my hope in the communion of saints. Even if Jesus may not have understood the afterlife in the same way that I do, I hope that the human spirit lives on in some way, whether as a legacy of love, or as a supernatural presence that interacts with the physical world. My hope is being affirmed just now. As I write this article, I am alone at church, and a beautiful cardinal is pecking at the window of my office.
