### **UTO for Everyone**

The United Thank
Offering, better known as
UTO, is returning to
Resurrection after having
been absent for several
years.



What is UTO?

United Thank Offering is a ministry of The Episcopal Church, which focuses on the spiritual practice of daily gratitude. In 1889, the Women's Auxiliary initiated the United Offering to support mission projects and to assist in sending female missionaries out to serve as teachers and nurses. This project became the United Thank Offering. Through the years, UTO has greatly expanded the mission of The Episcopal Church.

How does it work, and can I take part?

Each person will receive a Blue Box at church on Sunday, January 14. This program is for men, women and children, so YES, you can participate. If you prefer to participate together as a family unit, that works very well also and provides a wonderful lesson in being thankful, by recognizing our many daily blessings.

As you move through your day:

NOTICE the good things that happen.

GIVE thanks to God for those unexpected blessings.

MAKE an offering in the Blue Box for each blessing of that day.

BLESS because your blessings become blessings for others.

Towards the end of the calendar year we will celebrate our many blessings with an ingathering of our Blue Box monies. Each of our pennies, nickels, dimes, quarters and dollars collected will be sent to United Thank Offering of The Episcopal Church. UTO will award 100% of these funds as grants to selected applicants from all over the country, and the world.

Each of us has something good happen every day, and we should recognize the good things and be grateful for them. This simple program is an easy way to teach gratitude to our young people. Blessings come at every age too.

### A Good Pair of Binoculars

Participants in our Adult Forum just completed a book study of Finding God in the Waves: How I Lost My Faith and Found It Again Through Science. Many of us approached the book with the expectation that from it we might learn how the author, Mike McHargue, has reconciled faith and science. After all, he is known as "Science Mike" having hosted two podcasts exploring those topics. Many books have been written in an effort to reconcile faith and science or to establish the dominance of one over the other. McHargue's book does neither.

Mike McHargue was born and raised in a deeply religious family who practiced an increasingly rare form of authentic Christian discipleship. His parents centered their family life on biblical principles and values. Jesus was McHargue's friend as he struggled through a childhood of obesity, "nerdery" and loneliness. As he grew older, McHargue fell away from his religious

habits for a brief time, until he met his wife, Jenny. Together, they began raising a family in much the same way he had been raised, centering their lives in Christian faith. McHargue was a happily married family man, a deacon in his church and even taught Sunday school.

It was his parents' divorce that triggered McHargue's confrontation with the paradox of science and faith. His faith taught that divorce was a sin, and McHargue desperately sought to lead his father and mother to repentance and reconciliation through the study of scripture and the guidance of his pastors. He binge-read the bible, looking for just the right verse, parable or story that would convince his father to return to his life of obedience to God's will for marriage.

McHargue's effort accomplished something entirely different. His education and career were in the hard sciences. For the first time, McHargue studied the bible as a scientist might. What was revealed to him was not biblical truth, but contradictions, horrendous injustice and a vengeful, cruel god who demanded blood atonement. Although McHargue had read the bible in pieces, in Sunday School lessons and sermons, this time, McHargue read it start to finish – Genesis to Revelation – all the while keeping tabs on the irreconcilable notions. McHargue's Christian identity was based upon biblical inerrancy, but he could see little that was truly inerrant on this go-round.

McHargue saw no choice but to let go of his strict, literal interpretation of scripture and adopted a more progressive form of Christianity. But his struggle did not end there. The more McHargue read about the different approaches to truth offered by faith and science, the more convinced he became that Christianity was a farce, the bible just one long myth, and Jesus a fictional legend.

McHargue spent the next two years living a lie. To avoid disappointing his wife, or worse, leading her or their children to lose their own faith, McHargue put on a disguise. He continued the same lifestyle and lay ministry, teaching and professing a faith he no longer held. The charade took its toll, not surprisingly, and finally his wife confronted him. McHargue came clean to her

and to his mother. Though hurt and disappointed, they responded with the love, grace and patience that McHargue greatly needed.

Then came the day that McHargue received two fateful invitations – one to visit NASA's then-new Dryden Flight Research Center and the other to attend a conference hosted by Rob Bell, an author and Progressive Christian pastor who had hired McHargue's company to manage his website. The two events were being held near one another and so could be combined into one trip to the coast of California.

McHargue's experience on the coast of California is too beautiful to spoil with this article. I encourage each of you to read it for yourself. If you have ever found it a challenge to justify your belief in one creedal statement or another, you might find a new peace from following McHargue's lead.

McHargue has stopped trying to justify a faith in God or to verify the bible's message with empiricism. Instead, he has accepted this: science and faith cannot be reconciled, but they can be synchronized. As Chuck Gresham wisely analogized, faith and science can be the two lenses placed in a pair of binoculars that together allow a seeker to discover the profound.

The second part of McHargue's book is itself an application of that analogy. He has formulated axioms for faith, God, prayer, sin, the afterlife, salvation, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, the church and the bible by a parallel study of each through the lens of faith and the lens of science. He has formed his own theology, as we all should.

Most, if not all, of the participants in this book study were enthralled by McHargue's story. His experience and conclusions affirm our own view on the interplay of faith and science. We see better how we may relate to atheists and the "nones" of American society. We appreciated the axioms, regretting that he stopped before writing an axiom for religion itself and finding his adherence to labeling tiresome. Personally, McHargue's book made me grateful. During Advent and Christmas, I am reminded of the gifts "that don't come from a store." I am grateful for a community with whom I can express my

skepticism without fear of reprisal. Disguises are not needed at Church of the Resurrection. We all have doubts. We are all free to express our doubts to God and to one another. God is honored by our striving to understand.


